## The CEPE Family To Guyana **Robert's Testimony** I was born and raised on the Island of Trinidad as a missionary kid. After nine years on the field, we had to leave in order to get my brother proper treatment for cancer. He eventually passed away from the cancer, but God was good to us during that time. My parents made the decision to go back to the mission field, but this time God had laid Guyana on my dad's heart. We took a survey trip, and shortly after surrendering to go back, my father was also diagnosed with a rare form of cancer. His cancer also took his life. My mom, Sandra Cepec, is continuing and making plans to go back to the field. Through this, God was really working on my heart about salvation. I had made a profession at the age of seven, but did not really understand. God used this to get my attention. God convicted me heavily about my sins, and at the age of seventeen, I came to Christ. I surrendered to whatever God wanted me to do, and went to Bible college at Bethel Baptist College in Jacksonville, AR where I met my wife. She had already graduated at the time and was teaching. After two years of getting to know each other and courting, we were married in June 2020 soon after I had graduated with a Bachelors in Missions. Abigail's Testimony Abigail is a third generation missionary raised by Luke and Tonya Shelby, missionaries in Kenya, East Africa. Her grandparents Robert and Debbie Keeton are missionaries with the Rock of Ages. She was saved at the age of five and surrendered to missions at the age of nine. Her parents made sure that they included their children in the ministries on the field, whether it was in soul-winning, passing out invitations in the market places, helping in the children's VBS and other ministries, teaching Sunday School, helping in the music ministries, and much more. Her heart has always been tender towards missions and has been preparing for wherever God would have her serve one day. She majored in missions at Bethel Baptist College and continued education at Providence Baptist Bible College pursuing missions and Music. Throughout college and during her years as a teacher, she has been on several mission trips, but one particular trip Abigail made to the jungles of the Amazon River Basin touched her heart. It's neat looking back how that God planned that for a reason! Robert's Call My first year of Bible college, God called me to preach! It was an exciting event for me. I sought diligently what area of ministry God wanted me to be in. I had a love in my heart for missions, and missed the missionary life, but I wanted God to show me HIS will for my life. I told God that if he wanted me to be a missionary, I needed him to show me for certain. Rom. 10:14 "How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? and how shall they hear without a preacher?" Mark 16:15 "And he said unto them, Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." Verses like these seemed to stare right into my heart, and God used them to burden my heart for what he was going to call me to do.

I had gone on the survey trip to Guyana with my parents, and fell so in love with the people; but I knew I couldn't let emotion determine a call. "And he must needs go through Samaria." I thought to myself, why did Jesus need to go through Samaria? The answer is, there was one lady there that needed Christ and Jesus knew exactly where to find her. Christ stopped for one that some were not willing to stop for. I thought of Guyana. It is a small country full of crime and lost in darkness. Missionaries have come and gone. - Population: 788,400 souls (January 2021)
- Main Religions: 25 % Hindu, 7% Muslim, 23% Pentecostal, 45% claim some other form of Christianity, only a few Baptist churches exist in the country
- One of the highest Suicide rates in the world (on average 227 people per year)
- Guyana is 80% jungle and many areas can only be reached by plane or boat
- Many missionaries have gone but have decided not to stay.
